





## Albert Pike

A great American and a great Mason, the life of Pike is a part of the romance of this country. Outside the Craft he was known as a poet, journalist, soldier, jurist, orator, and his ability in so many fields fills one with amazement. Apart from the chief work of his life in Masonry, he merits honor as a philosopher and a scholar. Indeed, he was one of the richest minds of his age, resembling the sages of the ancient world in his appearance and in the quality of his mind.

Pike was born in Boston, Massachusetts, December 29, 1809, of a family in which are several famous names, such as Nicholas Pike, author of the first arithmetic in America, and the friend of Washington; and Zebulon Pike, the explorer, who gave his name to Pike's Peak. His father was a shoemaker who worked hard to give his children the benefit of an education; his Mother a woman of great beauty, was stern in her ideas and values of raising a family.

Pike was a very able editor, studying law at night, never sleeping more than five hours a day - which enabled him to do as much work as two men usually do. By 1835 he owned the Advocate, which contained some of his best writing. He spent countless hours digging deep into law, mastering its history, its philosophy; and, once admitted to the bar, his path to success was an open road.

Pike was made a Master Mason in Western Star Lodge No. 1, Little Rock, Arkansas, July, 1850; and the symbolism of the Craft fascinated him from the first. Everywhere he saw suggestions, dim intimations. half-revealed and half-concealed ideas which could not have had their origin among the common craft Masons of old. He began to study the Order, his enthusiasm keeping pace with his curiosity, in search of the real origin and meaning of its symbols. He found that Freemasonry is the Ancient Great Mysteries in disguise, it's simple emblems are the repository of the highest wisdom of the Ancient World. Here are his words: "It began to shape itself to my intellectual vision into something imposing and majestic, solemnly mysterious and grand. It seemed to me like the Pyramids in the grandeur and loneliness, in whose yet undiscovered chambers may be hidden, for the enlightenment of the coming generations, the sacred books of the Egyptians, so long lost to the World; like the Sphinx, half- buried in the sands. In essence, Freemasonry is more ancient than any of the world's living religions."

These are some of the principles he lived by every day that we should rethink for ourselves:

- 1. Man is accountable for the uprightness of his own spoken words, But not for the rightness of it.
- 2. The free country where intellect, love and genius rule, will endure.
- 3. When the state begins to feed part of the people, it prepares all to be slaves.
- 4. Deeds are greater than words. They have a life, silent but undeniable, and they grow with love as from a flower.
- 5. Life has its ills, but it is not all evil.
- 6. Our business is not to be better than others, but to be better than ourselves as Freemasons of our communities.

Albert died in April, 1891 at the age of 82 leaving behind a legacy and life style that many have so long studied.
