



#### The Altar

Today the Masonic Altar within our Lodge upon which resides the Holy Bible is a symbol of our communion and rituals with the Supreme Architect of the Universe.

Altars are usually found in sacred places like shrines, temples and churches. All major religions such as Christianity, Judaism, Buddhism, Hinduism, Shinto, Taoism etc. have Altars. Even the Pagans built Altars to their Gods.

Historically, an Altar is an elevated place or pedestal before which religious ceremonies were enacted or sacrifices offered up to the Gods.

The Altar and all utensils are considered sacred and all Priests from every faith have to vest and wash their hands before touching them, even to remove the ashes from a sacrifice.

In the Holy Bible many men are instructed to build and erect Altars to God. It clearly states the type of material to be used, the precise size, even the material for the different tools used to make it as well as what not to be used. The desire of man's attempt to receive Gods blessings back in those times through the use of an Altar is the same as our Masonic rituals of today.

When the Temple of King Solomon was built their were actually two Altars, one was for Burnt offerings which was kept outside the Temple and used wood or whatever available burnable material one could find to perform the sacrifice the other was kept inside for the use of Spiritual Rituals, Prayers and Incense cleansing of different flavors, Fig leaves and small branches were the preferred scent.

Altars are mentioned in many places in the Holy Bible and were erected by many famous men like, Noah, Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, King Solomon and Moses.

Moses built his Altars from unhewn stone, earth, brass and shittim (acacia) wood and this Altar moved with him and the children of Israel as they wandered through the wilderness after leaving Egypt while King Solomon used more lavish materials like Gold, Silver, Jewels, fine woods and linens and his had a more stable home within the confines of the Temple grounds.

The quest of ancient people to commune with God, even though many did not have an Altar or the means of constructing one is the same quest as Freemasons are in search of ... that of presenting ourselves and being pleasing in our Creators eye to receive his blessings.

All Altars including our Masonic Altar are phrased as "Tables of the Lord"

Our Masonic rituals are different from that of other religions and the Church, but the use of the Altar remains the same : To give praise to and receive blessings from God.

(Leviticus 16:13) "And he shall put the Incense upon the fire before the Lord that the cloud of the Incense may cover the Mercy Seat that is upon the testimony that he die not."
